The biosphere reserve concept compliments and helps to deliver our plans and policies by promoting sustainable economic development. They are places of cooperation, education and research where local communities, environmental groups, and economic interests can work collaboratively on conservation and development issues.

Giants in the Forest

This exciting project uses a new approach to involve people in arts events inspired by their surroundings. Evolving with the seasons over a nine month period a series of events and activities will be inspired by the family of living sculptures in the biosphere.







Giants in the Forest will also be online and will make full use of social networking technology to involve people and document the project from start to finish. Giant heads are also being erected in North Devon and Dyfi to make links with the two other biosphere reserves in the UK.

The Giants in the Forest was developed and managed by Vision Mechanics to be part of Creative Scotland 2012 and a way of involving people who don't usually participate in arts events. The activities are being co-ordinated locally by CatStrand with support from Dumfries and Galloway Arts Festival and the leader project Building opportunities in the Biosphere.

The three Giants which arrived in south-west Scotland's Biosphere, were planted up by three local groups and have been suspended from trees at the Otter Pool picnic site on the Raiders Road forest drive.

A website has been developed and a video of the heads being planted and hoisted into the trees is expected to be the first of many charting the changes in the forest.

Coordinating the local events Jodie Noble said, "This is a new opportunity to promote and inspire others using an environmentally sustainable arts project to connect communities in the Glen Kens to other areas in the south-west Scotland biosphere".

Forestry Commission Scotland is delighted that the Galloway Forest Park will be making a significant contribution to the aims of the Biosphere. Receiving this global recognition is a fantastic marketing opportunity which should bring about positive social, environmental and economic benefits for the people who live and work in Galloway and southern Ayrshire."
